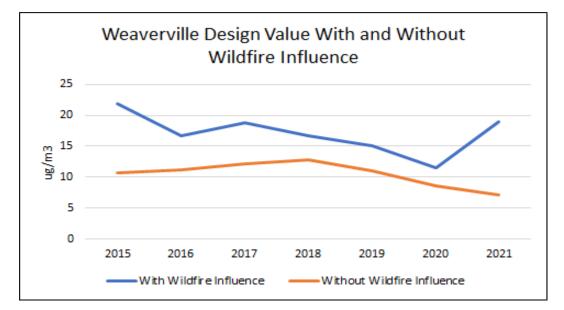




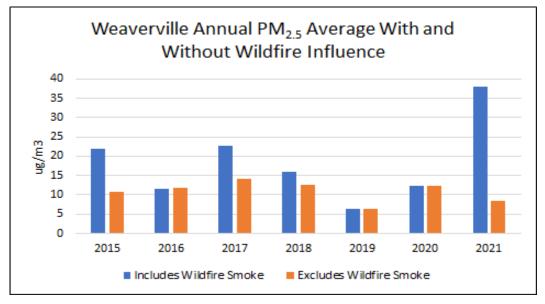


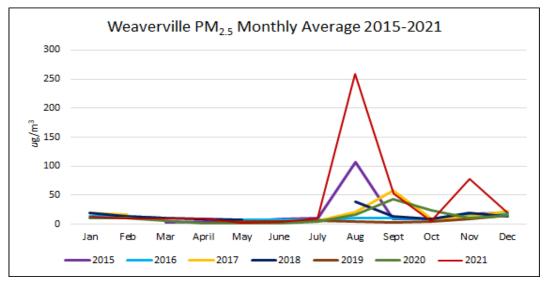


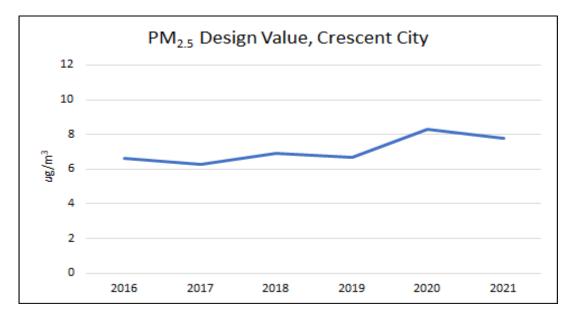
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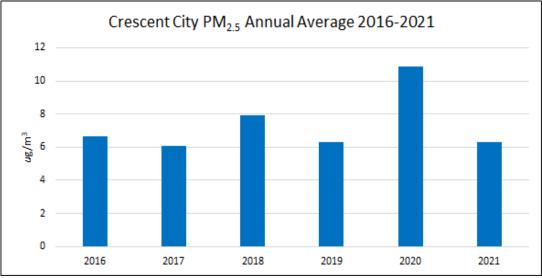


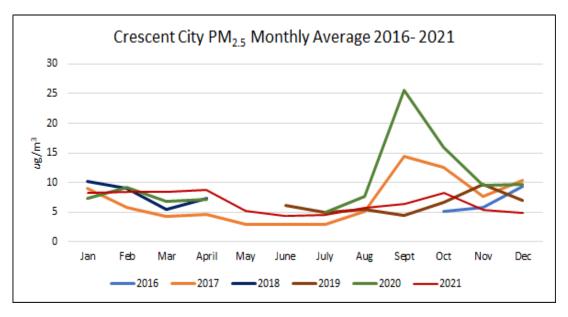
Weaverville PM_{2.5} Trends

SUMMARY:

Annually the status of the District's Reserve Fund is reviewed as it may be relevant to discussing the budget and/or addressing outstanding liabilities (Pension and Other Post Employment Benefits/OPEB). The "Reserve Fund" is not a separate account from the District's financial accounts, but rather whatever is remaining unencumbered in either of the two financial accounts.

At the April 2015 Governing Board meeting, the Board received and adopted the *District Reserve Fund Policy and Guidelines*. The adopted policy and guidelines set a goal of maintaining a minimum unencumbered Reserve of \$500,000, with a target of at least \$700,000 to \$1 million.

Since 2018, the Reserve has been increasing above \$1 million, with the eventual goal of applying any unencumbered funds toward the District's growing pension and OPEB liabilities. <u>Currently, unencumbered Reserve Funds are estimated to be about \$2.5 million</u>. Soon the actuarial will be finalized and liabilities updated so the Board can then apply these funds to reduce the liabilities through a Liability Funding Policy and through application of a defined-benefit plan (such as PARS or CalPERS).

ACTION REQUESTED: Accept and File

The following information is provided as a summary of items of interest to the Board and District. Staff solicits and appreciates any feedback concerning these items or other items of interest from the Board.

1. <u>Commercial Harbor Craft Regulation</u>

CARB recently approved updates to its Commercial Harbor Craft Regulation aimed at reducing emissions from harbor craft like fishing boats, tugboats, and ferries operated near California's coast. The amendments affect all categories of commercial harbor craft and establish the first emission standard requirements for commercial passenger fishing vessels, pilot vessels, tank barges over 400 feet, workboats and research vessels. These vessels are required to use cleaner engine fuel to reduce emissions under the current regulation, but they were not required to upgrade to cleaner engines previously.

The current commercial harbor craft regulation accelerated the move to Tier 2 and 3 engines for select categories beginning in 2009 through 2022. The new amendments will require zero-emission options where feasible, and cleaner combustion Tier 3 and 4 engines on all other vessels. In addition, they will also require the use of diesel particulate filters.

The new amendments will begin phasing in starting in 2023 through the end of 2032. CARB incorporated compliance extensions for some vessel categories that would not have to upgrade until the end of 2034 if the vessel owner applies for and receives an extension if a replacement vessel is required but cannot be afforded. To address concerns raised by the sportfishing industry, the Board approved changes recommended by staff that provide a one-time ten-year extension option for commercial passenger fishing vessels until 2035 if a vessel is equipped with all Tier 3 engines by the end of 2024. As a result of these amendments, commercial fishing vessels would no longer be eligible for Carl Moyer grants after 2023.

2. CARB & CALSTART incentives for Clean Trucks and Buses

CARB and CALSTART have reopened incentives for clean trucks and buses under the Hybrid and Zero-Emission Truck and Bus Voucher Incentive Project (HVIP) – see attached CARB article. This 2021-22 funding round is the biggest in history. This will make available almost \$200 million in standard HVIP funding and another \$200 million toward the deployment of more than 1,000 zero-emission public transit buses, 1,000 zero-emission drayage trucks, and 1,000 zero-emission school buses.

3. <u>Hearing Board Vacancies</u>

To date, there still have not been any responses to the additional recruitment outreach activities for the Medical Professional (Member and Alternate) and Professional Engineer (Alternate).

It states under H&SC § 40802: "*if the district board, in the case of a district with population of less than 750,000, is unable to appoint a person with the qualifications specified in section 40801 who is willing and able to serve, and for that reason a vacancy exists on the hearing board, the county district board may, in order to fill that vacancy, appoint any person to the hearing board.*"

Therefore, as an option, if appropriate individuals meeting the Medical Professional and/or the Professional Engineer cannot be found, it is at the discretion of the Governing Board to appoint other individuals as necessary to the Hearing Board. For example, Ms. Joanna Hawley-Jones who was appointed to the Public Member (alternate) position, could be appointed to one of the vacant positions and thus ensure the Hearing Board has adequate membership if necessary.

4. <u>Reauthorization of Carl Moyer Program</u>

CAPCOA intends to sponsor a bill that will provide reauthorization of the Carl Moyer Grant Program for 14 years. Although the bill will require a 2/3 vote by the legislature, preliminary indications indicate there is adequate support for such a bill.

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California Air Resources Board and CALSTART reopen incentives for clean trucks and buses

Over \$400 million now available to accelerate California's transition to zero-emission vehicles, representing biggest funding round in HVIP history

SACRAMENTO – The California Air Resources Board's Hybrid and Zero-Emission Truck and Bus Voucher Incentive Project (HVIP) reopens to new voucher requests today at 10 a.m. PT.

Launched by the California Air Resources Board in 2009, HVIP demonstrates the opportunity for first-come, first-served incentives that reduce the incremental cost of commercial vehicles. The project is administered by CALSTART, a national clean transportation nonprofit consortium.

The reopening offers \$196.6 million in standard HVIP funding for California-based businesses and other organizations transitioning their fleets to zero-emission vehicles (ZEVs). HVIP vouchers reduce the purchase cost of advanced-technology vehicles to reduce emissions and air pollution, with increased incentives for vehicles in disadvantaged communities or purchased by tribal entities.

In addition to the standard HVIP voucher funds, the program also makes available funding to support the deployment of more than 1,000 zero-emission public transit

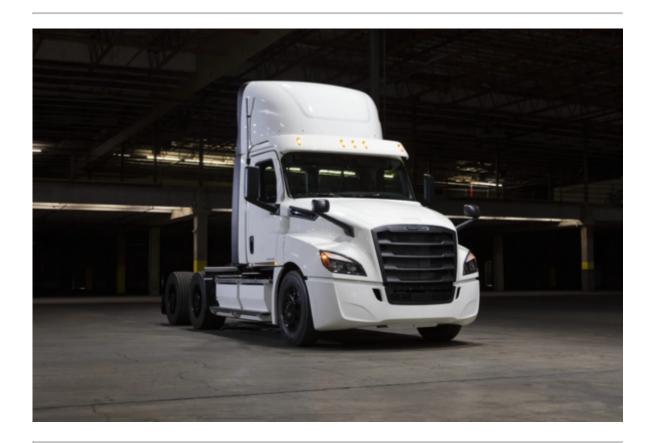
buses, 1,000 zero-emission drayage trucks, and 1,000 zero-emission school buses. Today, the program launches the initial round of funding to support these large-scale deployments, including:

- \$65.5 million for public transit buses
- Approximately \$40 million for drayage trucks
- \$122 million for public school buses

Once the drayage, public transit and public school bus set-asides are fully requested, HVIP will continue to allow standard voucher requests for these vocations while funding is still available. An additional \$23.4 million set-aside for the Innovative Small E-Fleets program is set to open later this spring.

The 2021-2022 funding round is the biggest in HVIP history, a testament to the growing opportunity and support for the electrification of commercial vehicles.

"Taking steps to collectively build cleaner communities has never been more urgent, particularly in communities hit hardest by truck traffic pollution," CARB Chair Liane Randolph said. "California has always led the charge in putting more of the cleanest heavy-duty clean vehicles on our roads and highways. This important voucher program plays a critical role in supporting Governor Newsom's vision for all medium- and heavy-duty vehicles to transition entirely to zero-emission by 2045."



"HVIP is the leading incentive funding project in California for heavy-duty fleets that seek to transition to zero-emissions vehicles," said John Boesel, President & CEO at CALSTART. "We hope that other states will continue to build upon the example we've set to pursue their own clean air commitments."

To date, HVIP has funded over 9,000 clean trucks and buses — 60% of which are located in communities disproportionately burdened by environmental pollution. With this year's investment, HVIP's cumulative impact since its inception has utilized over \$1 billion to put cleaner vehicles on the road. HVIP is part of California Climate Investments, a statewide initiative that puts billions of cap-and-trade dollars to work reducing greenhouse gas emissions, strengthening the economy, and improving public health and the environment — particularly in disadvantaged communities.
